

Mary Lynch, RN, MS, MPH, PNP, FAAN, is a Clinical Professor in the Department of Family Health Care Nursing, School of Nursing at UCSF and is the Specialty Coordinator for the Acute Care Pediatric Nurse Practitioner Program. She has had a life-long commitment to improving the health potential for sick infants and children. Mary has been instrumental in supporting education and faculty consultation for neonatal and pediatric nurses at UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital and she has been involved in numerous interprofessional faculty collaborations at UCSF and also in Honduras and Kenya.

One of the important strengths of the faculty workforce at UCSF is the representation of generational diversity, as our university community includes individuals from four different generations between 18-75+ years of age. Whereas the richness of our generational diversity is key to supporting the mission of UCSF, there is also the risk of potential misunderstandings to occur particularly in relation to generational differences in motivation, communication, and collaboration in working together. This discussion will summarize important similarities and differences across the four generations and highlight potential facilitators and barriers to supporting
